HAMMOND-ROGERS PARK INAUGURATION

Your Hammond-Rogers Park was inaugurated Saturday, August 30. This park was converted thanks to the preceding council's initiative.



Its nearly-completed conversion represents an investment of over \$600,000. The municipality is taking advantage of various grants for this achievement: one from the Ministry of Education, Leisure and Sports of nearly **\$284,000**, **one from the Rural Pact of \$108,000**, **a governmental program** which supports the revitalization of rurality, one for \$3,000 from "*Value your Health*" and \$**10,000 from the Enhancement of forest environment resources program – Component II.** We thank these partners that supported this project.

During the inauguration, over **60 persons were present at the park**. A large number of these persons took part in a treasure hunt. **Madam Brenda Dawson**, councillor, supervised this activity enabling people to visit the converted premises.

This park belongs to you. It aims to be a unifying place where one can perform a physical activity, play a favorite sport on the multi-functional skating rink, go about the converted trails or have one's children play on the elevated area designed just for them.





YARD SALE

WORD from the MAYOR

Dear citizens,

It's with renewed pleasure that I have the privilege of keeping you up to date of Council's objectives and the means set in motion to achieve them. The previous **Info Mille-Isles** informed you of our approach regarding the setting to standards of the fire hall and municipal garage. We thank you for welcoming this process. The work should be completed by next spring.

Mother Nature showed us with much intensity, especially on June 12, 13 and 24, that it was foolhardy to spend public funds (your money) in improving our roadways' surfaces when their construction limits and drainage were not suitable. Though our roads, compared to our neighbours' roads, were less damaged, Council has decided to prioritize work on ditches and the replacement of culverts before investing in asphalting.

This way of doing things does not mean that we don't care about the quality of our surfaced roadways. Quite the opposite; for the main gravel roads, we have demanded that the grader pass at least every three weeks. Furthermore, we are taking measures to patch the potholes until we have taken control of the drainage and road construction limits, when we will be able to resurface in a sustainable manner.

I am aware, as is Council, that this way of proceeding requires from each of us understanding and adaptation to the conditions of our road environment. However, I believe that this is the best way for us to succeed with road repairs within an acceptable time frame and without a sizeable tax increase.

As regards restoration of City Hall, in order to minimize costs, we are proceeding with a call for tenders or invited tenders with specialized companies, such as roofers for the roof assembly, as well as for the foundation's impermeability and its drainage. We will resort to professionals, architects and engineers when essential by virtue of law, namely when structural work or washroom facilities are required. You will note that we are taking the appropriate means in order to meet our needs in the most economical and productive way.

Along an altogether different line, I am letting you know that the municipality has retaken the old school property, a building commonly known as "Maple Grove". The building had been ceded in 2011 by the previous Council to the promoter of Les Sentiers du Domaine. As this acquirer had not fulfilled his obligations, we demanded and obtained the building's retrocession. We are now analyzing what we will do with the building in the name of the community's wellbeing. **Your suggestions are welcome**.

Last August 20, during a joint federal and provincial government press conference where the **four Argenteuil MRC mayors were invited**, I found out that the government contribution that will be transferred to the municipality within the framework of the **2014-2018 Gas tax and Quebec contribution Program (TECQ)** is \$817,348. We were informed that the federal-provincial agreement for the TECQ will be extended to the end of 2024. Thus, it will be easier for us to plan our road repairs, having a 10-year financing outlook.

In closing, I wish to thank all those that turned the **Mille-Isles Celebration** into a friendly day where the citizens' great participation enabled everyone to renew with Mille-Isles' sense of belonging. I wish to insist on the great involvement of Councillor Brenda Dawson, the political person in charge of leisure, Councillor Howard Sauvé, Councillor Dawn Charles as well as that of the majority of councillors, without forgetting the many volunteers' generosity which made this day a successful one. I cannot keep silent about the many sponsors that enabled us to offer the citizens over \$1,000 in prizes during the different draws and to wrap-up the event at an unhoped-for cost. They are:

As you can note, Council and I are making decisions that we believe are in your best interest, within our means. Rest assured that your comments are always appreciated. I remain at your service and I'll always be happy to meet you.

ENVIRONMENTAL CODE


Dear residents of Mille-Isles,

Living in Mille-Isles is coexisting with nature.

Within this perspective, the municipality has given itself an "**environmental code**" which proposes objectives for managing land, water and living things.

Being residents of this territory rich in biodiversity and natural landscapes, the environmental code will guide our actions in order to protect it, restore it and conserve it.

Prepared in collaboration with us, the members of the Urban planning advisory committee (UPAC), and other citizens committed towards protecting a quality environment, this



document will both be used to communicate the common values to which Mille-Isles citizens adhere to and to inform newcomers as well as all the other interveners called on to work here.

This document is on line on our web-site and if you wish to have a copy of this document on a USB key come by the office. This document is made possible with the help of a grant from Hydro-Québec within the framework of the integrated enhancement programme (IEP).

TEMPORARY WINTER MOTOR VEHICLE SHELTER (TEMPO)



Date to remember: October 1st

We would like to inform you a shelter may be installed as soon as October 1st and must be removed by May 1st of the subsequent year. Please also note that a minimum distance of two (2) meters must be kept between the shelter and any lot line, and that a minimum distance of four (4) meters between the road surface and the vehicle shelter must be respected to ensure the road user's visibility.

SKATING RINK SUPERVISOR, seasonal/part time position

Mille-Isles' municipality is looking for the candidates to fill three (3) seasonal/part time position as a skating rink supervisor. **Responsibilities**: Coming under the supervision of the Public Works department, your main responsibilities will be to ensure users' safety, administer first aid in case of minor accidents, maintain the rink and the skaters' room, proceed with the opening and closing of the premises and any other associated task that may be assigned.

Life in a wooded area

Living in a wooded area has many advantages. Are you living near a large green expanse? On must act with a certain amount of care.

Protect your life as well as those of your loved ones

- Install a smoke detector on each floor and near the bedrooms.
- Install a CO detector near the bedrooms and near the heating devices such as the wood stove, the fireplace and the oil furnace.
- Purchase a portable extinguisher and learn how to use it.
- Prepare an evacuation plan and foresee a meeting area.
- Do evacuation exercises at least once a year.
- Foresee two exits to evacuate the premises safely.
- With the neighbours, think of a mutual assistance plan in case of emergency.
- Check the flammability index set out by SOPFEU before starting up a fire outdoors. Listen to the news to find out about forest fire risks in your region.
- Do not use the outside fireplace during a dry period.



The roof

- Use fire-resistant roofing materials like metal, tar and treated shake.
- Remove bird nests, dead leaves and branches from the roof and gutters.
- Cut the branches and vegetation overhanging the roof.
- Cover the top of the chimney with a spark arrester.
- Have the chimney swept every spring and many times if your burn more than two cords a year.
- Close the eave and install three-millimetre wiring over the air vents. A soffit air vent placed too close to the wall enhances fire risks for the structure, as heat and embers rise along outdoor walls and enter soffit air vents.

Vegetation near the building

- If applicable, keep vegetation and combustible material three metres from the propane tank.
- Shred and compost woody debris or bring them to a landfill area. Don't burn them.
- Call the power company to have the trees which may have grown too close to the cabling pruned.

Help the firefighters

- Make sure the entry road is wide enough to allow emergency vehicles to get to your home if required. Confirm with the planning department for the regulation.
- If possible, have a pond or a pool so as to be able to provide the firefighters with an additional supply of water.
- Install one or two 200-liter reservoirs under the gutters in order to collect rain water.
- Keep tools around that can help you fight a fire: a water hose long enough to go around the house, pails, rakes, shovels, axes, a ladder to access the roof and a range of lawn-sprinklers.
